URBAN LEGENDS AS A GENRE: CHARACTERISTIC FEATURES

Urban Legends...

- are short prose texts
- are of unknown origin
- are spread orally among "realitively sophisticated, educated, urbanized modern people" (www.janbrunvand.com/faq.html) but also via the internet
- claim to be factual (friend-of-a-friend or FoaF)
- but are "demonstrably untrue" (T. J. Craughwell, p. 14)
- include an element of humor, horror or coincidence
- aim at teaching "a lesson about what happens to people who disregard the taboos of Judeo-Christian civilization."
 - (T. J. Craughwell, p. 14)
- occur (with minor variations) in different regions or countries (cf. www.janbrunvand.com/faq.html)


URBAN LEGENDS AS A GENRE: SCIENTIFIC RESEARCH


- 1960s: Linda Dégh at Indiana State University (Bloomington Indiana)



TEACHING URBAN LEGENDS: RATIONALE

- they are short and narrative
- contain simple everyday language
- they are entertaining (\rightarrow element of humor, horror or coincidence)
- offer authentic language material
- huge choice/ wide range of topics
- offer a cultural and geographical context as well as transcultural elements
- they enable ,authentic' production phases (>> oral tradition/ everyone can become a teller or re-teller of an urban legend)

TEACHING URBAN LEGENDS: CHALLENGES

- Finding a suitable Urban Legend for a certain group of learners can be challenging
- > violent, gruesome or sexually explicit content of some Urban Legends

TEACHING URBAN LEGENDS: METHODOLOGY

- pre-, while-, post-model
- while-reading phase can be devided into
 - first reading (global understanding/reading for gist)
 - second reading (detailed understanding/ reading for detail)
